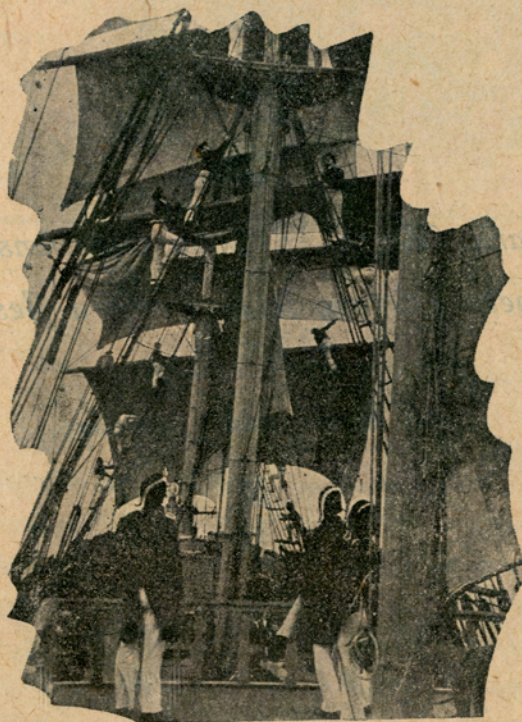

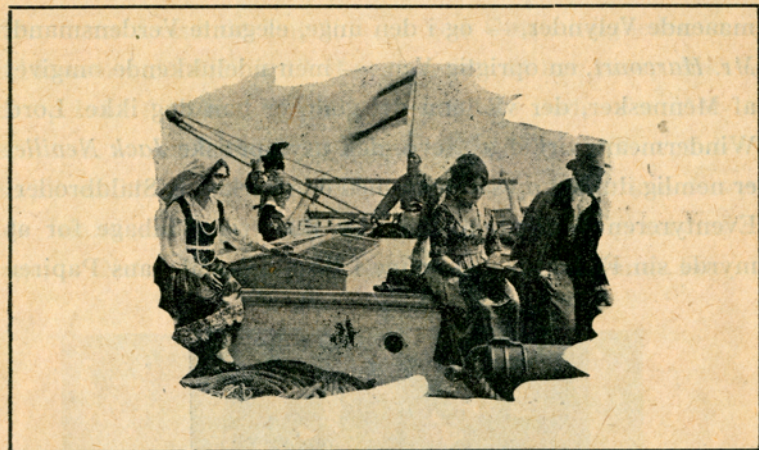

Kapergasten.

Hittebarnet *Jafet Newland* har tilbragt sine Barneaar paa Hittebørnshospitalet i London og er draget ud i Verden for at finde sin ukendte Fader. Hans tro Ven, den muntre og forslagne *Tim*, gør ham Følge, — og de to slutter sig til en omvandrende Zigeunerstamme, der ledes af den smukke og myndige *Nattée* og hendes Mand, den hemmelighedsfulde *Melchior*. De træffer der en purung Pige — *Fleta* —, som de mener er et stjaalet Barn, og hvis Venner og Beskyttere de bliver. En Dag bringer en fremmed Zigeuner *Matteo*, et hemmeligt Budskab til *Melchior*, der sammen med sin Hustru kort efter forlader Lejren for bestandig. Vore Venner bryder da ogsaa op og begiver sig til London, ledsaget af *Fleta*, der kan takke *Nattée* for, at hun har faaet sin Frihed. Hun bliver nu anbragt i en Pension for unge Piger, — og ved et heldigt Træf af Omstændigheder lykkes det *Jafet* at skaffe sig Indpas i de fornemme Kredse, hvor han mener, at han skal søge sin Fader. — — — I den højtansete *Lord Windermear*, der en Tid lang antager ham for sin Nevø, finder han en for-

maaende Velynder, — og i den unge, elegante Verdensmand, *Mr. Harcourt*, en oprigtig Ven, — men udelukkende omgivet af Mennesker, der vil ham det godt, er han dog ikke. Lord Windermears virkelige Nevø, den usympatiske *Jack Neville*, er nemlig dukket op sammen med en skurkagtig Staldbroder, Eventyrenen *William Atkins*, der ikke viger tilbage for at myrde sin Fælle for at komme i Besiddelse af hans Papirer



— og derved ogsaa af hans Rettigheder. Sin frygtelige Ugerning begaar han under saadanne Omstændigheder, at Mistanken let vil kunne ledes over paa Jafet, der paa det Tidspunkt, Forbrydelsen sker, har et natligt Møde med Fleta. Han har opdaget, at han og Tim bliver udspejdet af Zigeuneren Matteo, der — efter hvad han har faaet opsnuset — staar i en irsk Baronets — *Sir Henry de Clare's* — Tjeneste og har faaet i Kommission at opspore og bortføre Fleta. — Vor Helt beslutter derfor at rejse til Irland — dels for at undersøge hvilken Forbindelse, der er mellem denne Baronet og deres gamle Kending Melchior — og dels for at løfte det hemmelighedsfulde Slør, der hviler over Fletas Herkomst . . . Han opdager, at den, der staar bagved det hele, er Melchior, som nu tager ham til Fange. Og saa er det, at hans Ven Tim

bliver hans frelsende Engel! . . . Ved Omstændighedernes Spil kommer det nemlig til at gaa saadan, at han netop dukker op i det Øjeblik, da vor Helt skal lide Døden for Morderhaand, — og Resultatet af hans Optræden paa Skuepladsen bliver det straalende, at han og Jafet kort efter kan forlade Irland som Sejrherrer. — Melchior tager sig selv af Dage, — Nattée, der ikke har nogen Andel i sin Mands For-



brydelser, slutter sig igen til sit Folk, og Fleta bliver givet tilbage til sin Moder, der i mange Aar har begravet hende som død . . .

Og det lader til, at Lykken ogsaa paa anden Maade skal tilsmile vor Helt . . . Inden han forlader Irland, fører et heldigt Tilfælde ham nemlig sammen med hans gamle Principal, Apoteker Cophagus fra Vajsenhusets Apotek, og gennem ham kommer han paa Spor efter den Fader, som han har gjort sig saa mange Anstrengelser for at finde. Han faar omtrent Vished for, at denne ikke kan være nogen anden end en forhenværende *General de Benyon*, der bor i den portugisiske Havneby Pontevidera, — og han bestemmer sig straks til at opsøge ham. Den indflydelsesrige Lord Windermear skaffer ham om Bord paa Korvetten »Diomedes«, der

netop paa sit Togt skal anløbe Pontevidera, og paa hvilken han kommer til at gøre Tjeneste som Midshipman. Sin uadskillelige Ven Tim faar han endog med sig, idet denne bliver ansat som Medhjælper hos Provianskriveren. Inden Jafet siger Landjorden Farvel, faar han Lejlighed til at gøre Lord Windermear en Gentjeneste, idet han befrier ham for William Atkins, der optræder under sin myrdede Staldbroders Navn og gør Krav paa de Rettigheder, der tilkom denne. — Skurken er selvfølgelig rasende over at se sig afsløret og hævner sig paa sin Modstander ved at angive ham som Jack Nevilles Morder, — men inden Politiet faar taget Affære, er vor Helt allerede stukket til Søs. Til alt Uheld gaar det imidlertid saadan, at han faar sin svorne Fjende til »Skibskammerat«, idet denne — sammen med en Del andre — bliver »presset« til at gøre Tjeneste som Matros paa Korvetten . . .

. Togtet bliver derfor ikke helt behageligt for Jafet, for selv om han ikke direkte har noget at gøre med William Atkins, lykkes det dog denne med en djævelsk Snedighed at volde ham megen Fortræd. — For den brave Tim bliver Sømandslivet heller ikke noget rent Lystspil; — hans nærmeste Overordnede, Provianskriveren, er nemlig en meget sur og hovmodig Herre, der aldeles ikke kan goutere sin Skrивerdrengs mange kaade Indfald og med haard Haand lader ham undgælde derfor. —

»Diomedes« naar imidlertid ind under Portugals Kyst, — og saa sker det en Dag, at vor Helt faar Øje paa en Jolle, der driver om for Vind og Vove, og hvis eneste Passager lader til at være en ung Kvinde. Der sættes en Baad ud for at bjerge Jollen, — i hvilken man finder en udmattet Kvinde og et Lig af en Sømand.

Den unge, smukke Donna *Agnes de Silva*, — hos hvem den reddede Kvinde var Kammerjomfru, — var sammen med sin aldrende og svagelige Fader paa Vej til Pontevidera, hvor de havde deres Hjem. Om Bord paa den Skonnert, der

skulde føre dem hjem, var ogsaa Donna Agnes' Halvfætter, *Don Scipio*, og det var denne Lykkeridders Hensigt for enhver Pris at vinde sin skønne Slægtning — og dermed ogsaa de store Rigdomme, hun besad. Men hun afskyede og foragtede ham, og for at naa sit Maal begik han saa den Nederdrægtighed at forlede Mandskabet til at gøre Mytteri — og gjorde sig paa den Maade til Herre paa Skibet. Ved sin Kærestes — Styrmandens — Hjælp lykkedes det Kammerjomfruen at flygte, — og hun ved derfor intet om, hvad der videre er sket, — hvilken Skæbne, der er bleven hendes Frøken og dennes Fader til Del

. Øverstkommanderende paa »Diomedes« beslutter øjeblikkelig, at man skal forsøge at komme de Ulykkelige til Hjælp, — Skonnerten jages, og det kommer til Kamp mellem de to Skibe. Det jagede Skib søger imidlertid ind under Kysten, og Korvetten stikker for dybt til at kunne følge efter. Baadene sættes derfor i Vandet, — vor Helt faar Kommandoen over en af dem, og det skyldes hovedsagelig *hans* Mod og Uforfærdethed, at Sejren bliver vundet. Donna Agnes befries i sidste Øjeblik for sin farlige Tilbeder, men til alt Uheld lykkes det denne — sammen med William Atkins — at flygte i Land, og som Følge heraf kan den unge Portugiserinde endnu ikke føle sig sikker for Don Scipios Efterstræbelser.

En Dag, som Jafet og Tim vandrer rundt i Byen, faar de Øje paa en Plakat, der udlover en stor Belønning til den, som fanger Atkins og Scipio, der begge er flygtet fra Galejerne.

Nu gælder det om at komme dem i Forkøbet og søge at redde Donna Agnes og hendes Far fra Galejsslavernes Hævn. Om det lykkes, og om Jafet nogensinde finder sin Far vil vi faa at se i denne Films næste og sidste Del:

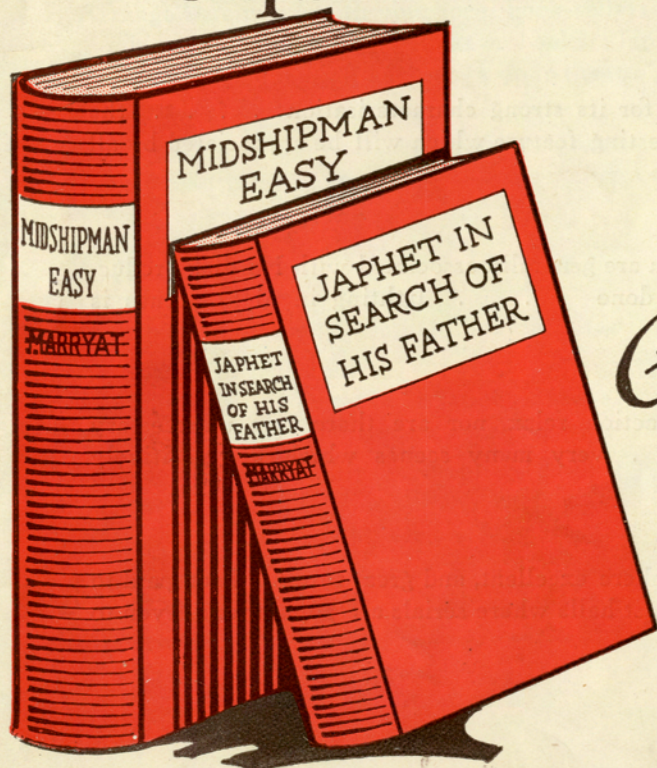

Accompanied by a fellow apprentice, Japhet Newland, a foundling, sets forth in search of his father. They join a band of circus gypsies. Japhet saves Fleta, the circus

sincerity wins the staunch friendship of the peer. Neville, the peer's real nephew appears, bringing trouble in his train.

Japhet and Tim discover that their movements are being watched and find that the spy is in the pay of the one-time gipsy king (now Sir Henry Clare) who for an unknown reason is endeavouring to regain possession of the girl Fleta.

Japhet, in Ireland, gleans the information that Fleta is Sir Henry's niece. He narrowly escapes being murdered and is rescued from prison by his faithful friend Tim.

In his search for his father it becomes necessary for Japhet to visit Pontevidera, Portugal. By the influence of his benefactor, Lord Windermear, Japhet obtains a commission in H.M.S. Dromedes which is

dancer, from Matteo, and between them comes into being a strong friendship. Japhet is already in love with Susanna, a charming young quakeress, a friend of the apothecary to whom he had been apprenticed.

The gipsy tribe is disbanded and Japhet undertakes the care of Fleta. He sends her to a boarding school and with Tim sets out for London. Through a misunderstanding Japhet is recognized as the nephew of Lord Windermear. For family reasons Lord Windermear wishes his "nephew" to keep his identity secret and Japhet agrees.

Shortly Japhet confesses his imposition and his

bound for that port. Tim secures the position of purser's clerk.

The "Dromedes" picks up a drifting rowing boat and the sole occupant tells how she escaped from a

vessel which had been seized by its mutinous crew.

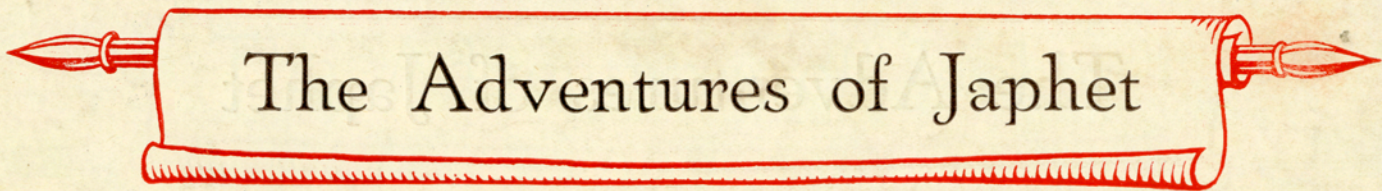
